Christopher Lees, 22, is immensely enjoying his third season as Music Director of the Michigan Pops. As a first year Masters student in the Orchestral Conducting program, he assists with the University Symphony and University Philharmonia Orchestras, and, beginning in January, will be the Assistant Conductor of the Campus Philharmonia orchestra. He has conducted various orchestras on campus (Das Korngold Festspiel Orchester, 2004; Michigan Sinfonietta, 2004; Mariah Carey Festival Orchestra, 2002) and in 2003 he won the undergraduate division of the American Choral Directors Association National Conducting Competition.

A Washington, D.C. native, accomplished organist, and *summa cum laude* graduate of the University of Michigan (2004), Christopher studied this summer at the Conductors Retreat at Medomak under Kenneth Kiesler, with whom he continues study in Ann Arbor. Christopher also serves as the Associate Director of Music at First Presbyterian Church (Birmingham, MI) where he directs and accompanies choral and handbell ensembles for singers and ringers ages 7-107.

A Brief Look Behind the Scenes

As a student organization within the University, the Michigan Pops orchestra is more than simply working to put on two shows a year for the public. At the core of the group are students who are united by a love of music; the majority of the players you see on-stage tonight are not music majors, and most do not have plans to enter musical careers on a professional level. But every one of them has given up a large chunk of their time in order to continue playing and participating in music, and the work put into tonight's concert by the 80 plus members of the Pops orchestra is a process that is both amazing and worth a brief look into.

Organizing and planning for concerts, the Executive Board is a group of students who also play in the orchestra. They are responsible for finding music for the shows, organizing events, rehearsals, and even social activities. It's not unusual to see Pops members socializing at NYPD or Pizza House after a rehearsal or a concert (pizza is very important in the socializing process).
