9% - Superman, Somewhere Out There





As he stands on the podium conducting Superman he turns to the entire orchestra and says, "These [notes] need to be infused with impending doom... It's like an orgo exam waiting to happen!" A combination of laughs and groans emanate from the musicians and off we go again in another whirlwind rehearsal of Michigan Pops.



Chris Lees has been the Pops conductor for four years now after being introduced to the orchestra by singing with the chorus his freshman year. Chris came to UM as an organ and music education major. His plan was that when he graduated he would return to his home town of Rockville, MD and play organ at the local church and fix the music program at the local school. That was before he heard the Verdi Requiem performed by University Symphony Orchestra. "I was so impressed by the size and the magnitude of the piece. Oh Baby! I went out and bought my five dollar baton and would stand in my room and conduct the piece in my head." The rest, as they say, is history.

Chris' favorite composers and pieces fade in and out, "There's just so much great music it's hard to take it all in and know all of it," but they include Tchaikovsky and Beethoven. He loves to listen to the Chicago Symphony, San Francisco Symphony, Boston, Detroit, and the Kirov Orchestra which is conducted by one of his favorite conductors, Valery Gergiev. However, even with all of this classical influence, Chris is still highly influenced by artists like Billy Joel and Elton John, and a Jazz Improvisation class he took his freshman year. With this range of musical interest, Chris brings a lot of variety to the podium which makes him a good conductor for a group like Pops. He also brings a fun way of looking at rehearsals, having musicians move around and sit next to another instrument at least once a semester to promote listening and knowing other parts as well as creating camaraderie within Pops. When asked how Pops has impacted other parts of his life, "It's forced me to become more organized," he says with a laugh. The best and worst parts of conducting an orchestra? The best is the fun music, great community, and the unique mission of Pops, which is to cater to both of these. The worst is the logistics, though on the plus side, "It's taught me how to talk to publishers and distributors, etc, and how to be persistent." His first semester with the orchestra it took multiple emails and phone calls that were finally returned three months later for him to be told, "Ok, you can play this

piece of music, but by the way the publisher is in New Zealand!" "But I was persistent and it was an awesome concert." And next year after leaving Pops, what does Chris want to do? "I want to be an assistant conductor in a major orchestra. I'm not done learning yet. I have so far to go. I'm mentally done with academia, but there's still so much I still want to learn and being understudy to someone fantastic would be a great way to do that." And in the long run Chris wants to travel the world making music. "If I could do that, I'd be the luckiest guy in the world!"

Of course, since this is an ANIMATED POPS concert, I couldn't let Chris go without asking him what his favorite superpower would be. "To fly. To be able to travel, and get up and go, without traffic and away from all the hustle and bustle. I equate flying with freedom and serenity." And his favorite superhero growing up? "Anyone, like in X-Men, who could move things with their hands; just a gesture and it would go flying across the room." At which point, I had to wonder. Gesturing with hands as a superpower... Perhaps this is the true reason behind Chris' decision to be a conductor as with a flick of his wrist, the music begins.
