

#### **Our Conductors**



Steve Jarvi feels privileged to be the Music Director of the Michigan Pops Orchestra. Jarvi began his conducting career at the age of 17 as an Assistant Conductor for the West Shore Symphony Orchestra. Since then he has gone on to conduct all genres of music. Last year he appeared as the Music Director of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society's production of *Patience* as well as a Guest Conductor of the U of M Arts Chorale. Orchestral conducting also took him overseas to the Czech Republic where he was the youngest and only American participant in the Marienbad International Workshop and

appeared as a Guest Conductor of the West Bohemian Symphony Orchestra. Highlights of this year have included conducting the Michigan premiere of Widor's *Simphonia Sacra* in its third ever performance in the United States as well as being the Assistant Conductor of the Comic Opera Guild. Later this year, Jarvi will travel on scholarship to Austria to spend a week of study and observation with Berlin Philharmonic Music Director, Claudio Abbado, at the Salzburg Easter Festival. Along with his duties with the Pops, Steve is also Music Director of Commerce United Methodist Church.

Steven Jarvi is a Senior pursuing a BM in Music Theory and Orchestral Conducting through the Artist and Scholars program here at the U of M. He has had the opportunity to study with many talented musicians including: Kay Wells, Murray Gross, Harold Farberman, Johannes Schlaefi, Katherine Collier, Marianne Ploger, Jimmy Wimer, Jerry Blackstone, Martin Katz, and Kenneth Kiesler.

#### Assistant Conductor

James Gross is a senior in the School of Music. He began violin at the age of three in his hometown of Plymouth, MI and eventually graduated from the Interlochen Arts Academy. Formerly Principal Violist of the University of Michigan Symphony Orchestra, James has also been a member of the Schleswig-Holstein Music Festival Orchestra and is currently a substitute violist in the Grand Rapids Symphony Orchestra. This past summer was spent at the International Workshops Conducting Program in Glasgow, Scotland. James is currently student teaching in the Dexter Public Schools and will be graduating in May with a degree in Viola Performance with Teacher Certification.



#### Ralph Williams



Ralph G. Williams was born in London, Canada, and was schooled in Ontario and in the U.S., taking his B.A. from Andrews University in 1963, and his M.A. (1964) and Ph.D. (English Language and Literature, 1969) from the University of Michigan. He taught first at Cornell University, and then returned to the University of Michigan, where he is now Professor of English, and Associate Chair of the Department of English Language and Literature.

Professor Williams teaches

courses in Shakespeare, the Bible in English, Primo Levi, and the epic tradition, among others. His interest in drama includes acting, notably in medieval and renaissance plays, taking the role of Faust, for example, in Marlowe's play of that name, and, most recently, of Thomas More in Bolt's play "A Man for All Seasons." He has directed the Program on Studies in Religion at the University, and, repeatedly, has both directed and taught in the University's program in Florence, Italy.

Professor Williams is the recipient of numerous awards for teaching and service at the University, including the Distinguished Service Award, the Amoco Award, the Class of 1923 Award, the Excellence in Education Award (twice), and the Golden Apple Award.

#### Shirley Verrett, Soprano



An internationally-renowned opera singer and recitalist, Shirley Verrett has achieved recognition as one of the world's great artists. Her orchestral appearances, films, concerts, and recordings have gathered her accolades from *The New York Times, Opera* magazine, *Corriere della Sera, Opernwelkt, Chicago Times, Musical America, Newsweek,* and *The Washington Post* among other international news organizations.

Ms. Verrett's rare combination of vocal gifts, unequaled presence, and elegant style has made her a star at all the world's great opera houses, including the Metropolitan Opera, La Scala, the Royal Opera

House, Covent Garden, the Bolshoi Opera, the Paris Opera, the San Fransisco Opera, the Vienna Staatsoper, and the Lyric Opera of Chicago.

Shirley Verrett was a member of the Metropolitan Opera for nearly 25 years where she was always praised by critics for her assumption of a unique and varied repertoire -- from "Carmen" to "Norma." Throughout her long and distinguished career, Ms. Verrett has been acclaimed for her exceptional gifs as a singing actress.

Shirley Verrett has performed regularly with the world's greatest orchestras and conductors including Igor Stravinsky, Thomas Schippers, Sir George Solt, Leopold Stokowski, Leonard Bernstein, James Levine, Zubin Mehta, Claudio Abbado, Calor Maria Guilini, Seiji Ozawa, and Herbert von Karajan. Ms. Verrett has also sung and recorded with many other renowned singers from Leontyne Price, Placido Domingo and Luciana Pavarotti to Montserrat Caballe, Beverly Sills and Marilyn Horne.

Shirley Verrett was born in New Orleans and raised in Southern California. She graduated from the Juilliard School of Music in New York. She is the recipient of many honors and awards and was, in 1970, decorated with the French Government's highly coveted Chevalier des Arts et des Lettres, and in 1984 was again recognized with the more prestigious Commandeur des

Arts et des Lettres.

Having always had a love for Broadway, Shirley Verrett performed the role of Nettie Fowler in Rogers and Hammerstein's *Carousel* at the Vivian Beaumont Theatre at Lincoln Center in New York City during the 1994-95 season. This production was under the direction of Nicholas Hunter and won five Tony Awards. It also garnered Ms. Verrett a nomination for the Outer Critics Circle Award. She was also an honoree of the Drama League.

Shirley Verrett joined the faculty of the University of Michigan School of Music as a James Earl Jones distinguished University Professor of Music (voice) in September 1996. She is currently awaiting the release of an autobiographical account on her life titled, "All of My Life."

#### Justin Bruns, Violin

Justin Bruns began private studies at age three in Denver, gave his first public performance when he was four years old, and made his orchestra solo debut when he was fifteen. He has performed for numerous college and university presidents, the Vice President of the United States, the Duke and Duchess of Westminster, and in concert halls, university settings, cathedrals, and festivals throughout the United States and abroad. Mr. Bruns appeared as soloist with the Colorado, Jefferson, Littleton, Rocky Mountain (Lakewood), Stockport, and University (Michigan) Symphonies, the Chester Philharmonic, and the Sinfonia of Colorado. He won the Denver Young Artists Orchestra's Concerto Competition, toured Italy with them, and served on their Board of Directors. In addition to recital performances in eight states, Mr. Bruns gave two recital tours of the United Kingdom, performing in Birkenhead, Birmingham, Chester, Lincoln, Liverpool, Manchester, Winchester, and in Wales. He has appeared with the Michigan Chamber Players, and as a member of the chamber ensemble "Vivace" performed at the National Repertoire Orchestra and Walt Disney World. Mr. Bruns has held concertmaster and principal positions of eleven orchestras including the North American Chamber Orchestra, Littleton Sympony, and Aspen Sinfonia. He attended Aspen Music School on fellowship for the past three summers. While a member of the Kocapelli String Quartet, they were awarded special scholarships and received distinction for three years. Enrolled in the Artists and Scholars Honors Program at the University of Michigan, he studies privately with Paul Kantor, and works in close associaton with Andrew Jennings, Anton Nel, and Martin Katz in string quartet and chamber music studies. Mr. Bruns is a grant recipient of the Young Musicians Foundation of Colorado, a non-profit organization supporting talented, young Colorado artists pursuing professional music careers.
